Crossword puzzles are a traditional part of many newspapers. Since 1913, when Arthur Wynne published the first crossword of the New York World, puzzlers all over the world have been fond of these head-scratching games [source: Brief History of Crossword Puzzles]. And there is more to crossword puzzles than fun; some studies have shown that regularly solving puzzles like crossword puzzles or Sudoku can help improve your memory, and can even reduce mental decline in the elderly [source: Christie]. Crossword puzzles are also a great way to improve your vocabulary and general knowledge. Some crossword puzzles are simple, but some are definitely not. The famous Sunday crossword in the New York Times is one of the hardest out there, and it's not for the faint of heart. But don't despair – there are plenty of tricks out there that can help turn you into a puzzle master. Remember, the harder the puzzle, the more satisfying it is when you fill in the last square. Ready to dive in? Read on for top 10 tips for solving crossword puzzles. Content Crossword puzzles are a bit like cobwebs; Each response is connected to the others nearby to form a woven network of letters. Tugging on a string of letters affects all the others as well. Most crosswords are naturally divided into several groups of upside-down clues, connected to the other groups by longer responses. With this in mind, working through the puzzle one cluster of columns at a time – as opposed to going through all over clues at once, followed by all down clues

– is a good strategy. Every word you fill in will help solve the others around it. Sometimes crossword craftsmen will draw in other languages for their answers. But how do you know if the answer is in English or something else? You'll have to rely on the clue to tell me. If the wording of the clue refers to a particular city or country, or if part of the clue is in a foreign language, it's a pretty surefire indicator that your answer should be in the same language [source: Sayles]. Few crossword enthusiasts are actually fluent in the languages most commonly found in the clues, but a basic knowledge of articles, verbs and personal titles in some of the more common languages will go a long way. French, Spanish, German and Latin are particularly popular with puzzle craftsmen. A popular strategy for testing is to go through all the issues and skip the ones you don't know. And even if they are not multiple choice, you can do the same with crossword puzzles - thankfully, without being at the end. Don't spend too much time tearing your hair out over a clue you just can't crack. Move on to the simple ones, because that strategy comes with a bonus: filling in the answers you know will give letters for those you don't. It significantly limits the possibilities, especially for clues where more than one answer may apply. Are you stuck with a half-finished puzzle and a spinning head? Don't let it stress you out – crossword puzzles are supposed to be challenging, but they're also supposed to be fun. It's okay to just walk away for a while. If you're not competing at the American Crossword puzzle tournament, there's no time limit, so don't go nuts trying to finish the puzzle on your lunch hour. Sometimes the best thing you can do is take a break and clear your mind. Come back to that later, and you might be surprised at what jumps out at you. It happens to all of us. If you stare at a word long enough, suddenly it just looks wrong – even if it's a word you've spelled right since junior high. So it wouldn't be too strange to spot a misspelling among your answers, would it? Putting an E before an I instead of the other way around can throw away the other clues in that particular part of the puzzle. There will also be times when the answers originally come from a language like Arabic or Russian, whose alphabet is quite different from the Latin alphabet most Western countries use. As a result, there are often a number of accepted spellings for these translated words. In these cases, the clue will usually contain a parenthetical var. to indicate that there is more than one established way to spell the word in question. Is there a puzzle clue giving you extra trouble? Does it have a question mark at the end? In the world of crossword puzzles, a clue with a question mark means that special hint requires a second look. Usually, that bit of punctuation is an indication that the clue itself is a pun, as opposed to a simple question that requires an answer or a fill-in-the-blank [source: Sayles]. So, the most obvious answer is probably not the right one. Think of all the possible meanings of the clue; You can always ruminate on it while moving on to other parts of the puzzle. Lots of crossword puzzles have a title that gives an insight into the theme of the puzzle. And whether the puzzle has a title or not, it will almost always have a theme. Throughout the puzzle, the author will spread answers that tie back to the theme. These answers will usually be longer and contain more than one word. Often, the clues will be a piece on the theme, so the connection may not be immediately obvious. Still, keeping the theme or title in mind as you go through clues can provide some insight to lead you in the right direction. Let's call a shovel a shovel. But does that mean we call the shovel a shovel - or a suit of cards? Some words have not only one or two meanings, but several. Part of the puzzle doesn't come together, and one of the clues may have more than one answer, try them all out. Especially be on the lookout for words with multiple meanings in the question mark clues mentioned earlier. Puzzle composers and editors are a sneaky bunch; they will use several meanings to throw addicts away the scent. Thinking outside the box, both literally and figuratively, will help you finish the job. Are you waffling between more than one possible answer, or maybe just taking a stab in the dark? There will always be times when you think you know what the answer is, but you can't be 100 percent sure. Do you take a chance and write in your guess, or not? If the answer in question cuts with yet another maybe-it-is-maybe-it-isn't clue, skip it for now. Writing in the wrong answer can lead you astray, especially if you are one of those brave souls who prefer to do the puzzle in pencil. Instead, trust the answers you know are correct to lead you back to safe territory. There is absolutely no shame in relying on a reference book. Some of the main benefits of crossword puzzles are expanding your own knowledge and vocabulary. If you've solved all the down clues in a cluster but one of the resulting over responses isn't a term you're familiar with, pull your trusty Oxford English Dictionary off the shelf. You'll either find out that the word is correct and add something new to your phraseology, or you'll find that some of your down answers need to be reconsidered. Other reference books, such as a thesaurus or encyclopedia, are equally useful. After all, if you knew every crossword answer without even trying, it wouldn't be so much fun – and you wouldn't have a new nugget of trivia to bandy laying at cocktail parties.
